Dear Mr. Eutler:

Thank you for your letter of March 9, 1964, raising questions relating to Professor Norman Redlich, who is serving as a consultant to the President's Commission on the Assassination of President Kennedy.

Becurity requirements for federal employees are governed by President Elsenhower's Executive Order Ko. 10450, which provides that "The appointment of each civilian officer or employee in any department or agency of the Government shall be made subject to investigation." Such an investigation is being made in the case of Professor Redlich by the Civil Service Commission and the Federal Dureau of Investigation. This investigation is not yet complete.

Pursuant to E. O. 10450, when the investigation is complete the facts which have been developed will be evaluated by the members of the Commission, who will then determine whether a security elearance should be granted to Professor Redlich. The numbers of the Commission are Earl Marren, Chairman, Richard B. Russell, John Sherman Cooper, Eals Boggs, Gerald R. Ford, John J. McCloy, and Allen W. Dulles. Earl Marren is Chief Justice of the United States. Messre. Russell, Cooper, Boggs, and Ford are leading Democratic and Republican members of the United States Congress. Mr. McCloy is former High Commissioner of Germany. Mr. Dullos is former acud of the United States Central. Intelligence Agency.

Under our democratic system of government, the Cormission must judge only the loyalty of Professor Bedlich and not that of persons with when he is associated. I can think of few groups of men who are better able to make such a decision than the members of the Cormission, consisting of some of the foremost men in this country and representing various shades of political opinion.
