I was heartened to read your letter to the editor ("Facts on J.F.K.'s Death") in today's New York Times.

The enclosed material (articles and editorial from The Texas Observer of August 13, 1971 and copy of my letter of 7 September 1971 to David Belin) address the issue of Mr. Belin's individual conscience and the degree of public trust to which he is entitled. Belin's conduct in the matter of the testimony of Charles Givens, as described and documented in the enclosed article, compromises him personally and the Warren Report in general, to state the position in cautious terms. Personally, I am convinced that the evidence I have marshalled, exclusively from the Warren Commission's own exhibits and documents, clearly implicates Belin in collusion and the suborning of perjury.

You may be interested to know also that the enclosed material was sent to Harrison E. Salisbury, the editor of the Op-Ed page, in September and was therefore available to him well before he elected to publish, without caveat, Belin's self-serving apologia for the Warren Report.
