

Archives Sued for Data On JFK 'Conspiracy'

CHICAGO (AP) — A suit charging the National Archives in Washington with suppressing documents concerning an alleged plot to assassinate the late President Kennedy in Chicago has been filed in U. S. District Court.

The suit, filed yesterday by legal researcher Sherman Skolnick, contends that the archives are withholding in-

formation that shows Kennedy died not at the hands of a lone assassin but as the result of a conspiracy.

The Warren Commission, appointed by President Johnson to investigate the assassination, said that Kennedy was killed by a single man, Lee Harvey Oswald, and that it could find no evidence of any conspiracy.

The suit asserts that five conspirators planned to kill Kennedy at the Army-Air Force football game in Chicago Nov. 2, 1963. But when the President canceled his appearance because of a cold at the last minute, the suit continued, the assassination attempt was rescheduled for Dallas three weeks later.
