

'Assassination Photos' Are Taken Off Market

Copies of photographs purportedly made at the autopsy of President Kennedy were taken off the market yesterday by a conspiracy theorist who had said that he wanted to sell the pictures to finance a continuing investigation into Mr. Kennedy's death.

"I'm in a very dangerous and exposed position," the theorist, Harrison Livingstone, said yesterday. He said that the photographs were not stolen, but that he feared that the Justice Department might take action against him anyway. "The photographs," he said, "will not be available."

Mr. Livingstone, a freelance writer from Baltimore, said that he and his attorney, Glen M. Fallin, had probably made a mistake by offering to sell the pictures to a variety of news organizations. "I didn't realize," he added, "that the Kennedy family didn't want these things made public."
