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## Possibility of Two Gunmen In Robert Kennedy Killing Discounted by Investigator

LOS ANGELES, May 26—Those who contend that there was a second gunman in the fatal shooting of Senator Robert F. Kennedy led to take into consideration the results of ballistics tests or eyewitness reports, the special counsel investigating the case testified today.

The lawyer, Thomas Kranz, testified before a special committee of the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors re-

garding charges that there had to be another gunman because photos taken shortly after the shooting seemed to indicate that more bullets had been fired than Sirhan B. Sirhan's pistol could hold. These allegations, he said, do not take into account the fact that no one present in the pantry of the Ambassador Hotel reported seeing a second gunman.

"The photos aren't clear whether the so-called bullet holes are really bullet holes or nails," Mr. Kranz said. "There may seem to be more bullet holes because several bullets passed through Kennedy's body."

Seven top firearms experts ruled out the possibility of a second gun in 1975 after they re-fired the weapon and conducted other tests.

The hearing was part of a continuing investigation by the county board into the disputed aspects of the Kennedy assassination, which took place in Los Angeles on June 5, 1968. Two Los Angeles County supervisors will question Sirhan Sirhan about the murder at Soledad Prison on June 2.
