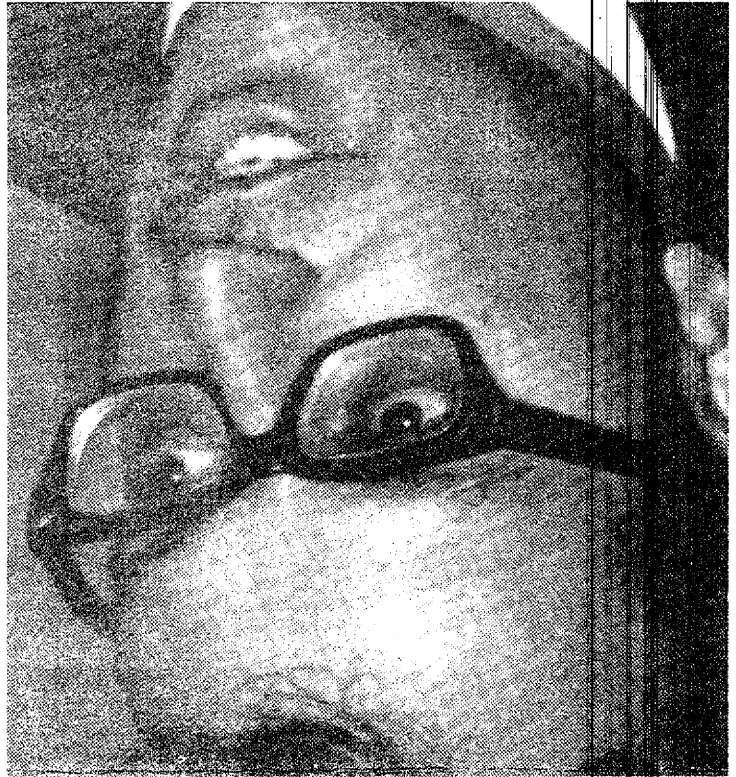

United States Ambassador to the U.N. for Special Political Affairs, 1977-78; resigned after disagreements with Administration policies in Middle East and elsewhere.

Foreign Policy Assistant to Senator Hubert H. Humphrey, 1959-60; Educational Affairs Assistant to Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, A.A.U.N. Educational Program, 1956-57; John F. Kennedy Fellow at Harvard, 1971; Adlai Stevenson Fellow at Choate, 1978.

Number 7 on Nixon's Enemies List; Co-Chairman, Conference of Concerned Democrats, the national group organized to provide Democratic Party alternatives to the war in Vietnam.

A Congressman who sponsored landmark bills, including urban mass transit trust fund, federalization of welfare costs, housing, health, and tax reform programs, prohibition on dumping sludge in the New York Blight.
