Dear Mr. Hoover:

XMEFor the past five years, in my spare time, I have endeavored to read the Warren Commission Report and the 26 volumes of evidence. As part of this study, I have also ordered various documents filed as part of the Commission's records in the National Archives.

I recently came across an FBI document in this case that disturbs me, for this reason I am addressing this to your attention.

Commission Document 7, page 328, had been classified and was only recently made available for research by the 1970 Review of the Commission's numbered document file. Page 328 of CD7 is attached, and appears to be a report of transmittal of various pieces of evidence received by the F.B.I. laboratory in Washington from the F.B.I. field office in New Orleans.

I would direct your attention to the item listed as QC38 -- "PhotoGraphs of two-xxxx page handwritten letter to the "Worker" 23 W. 26th Street. "signed Lee H. Oswald". This evidence was delivered to the Washington laboratory on November 25, 1963 and appears to have originated with the New Orleans office.

It would seem that the New Orleans FBI office, as part of some vn-explained survailliance activity, intercepted (swald's letter in New Orleans before it was sent to New York. Someone then opened this letter and photographed it and replaced it in it's envelope and returned it to the mails.

This servailiance could also have occurred at the New York FSI office before the letter was delivered to the Worker.

This letter was found among the files of "the Morker" at the New York address after the assassination and included as part of the evidence in Volume 22, page 257 of the Commission's Hearings and Exhibits.

Perhaps this letter was intercepted and photographed pursuant to some court order obtained in New Orleans in June of 1963 as part of a legal search of Oswald's mail. If this is true, the Warren Report does not reflect this action.

In your testimony before the Commission you mention that "we knew of his contact with the...Worker Publication in New York". (Volume 5, page 106). Was this as a result of a "mail cover" by the FBI in New Orleans.

It should also be noted in this regard that Oswald wrote another letter to The Worker post marked Dallas, Texas, November 2, 1963. This letter, airmailed, was delivered to the Worker's New &rk York address exactly four weeks later (Volume 10, pages 103-105), and one week after the assassination.

Might this unusual delay be accounted for if Cawald's mail wrw were being intercepted and photographed?
