WAS OSWALD GUILTY?

Lord Devlin in his friendly judgment on the Warren Report has not Sir, dealt with one piece of evidence which the layman has found it very hard to understand: the identification of Oswald from a police car, after a radio description, by Patrolman Tippit. Dallas is a great city, there must have been a lot of agitation in the streets after the murder of the President, this was the afternoon--it was not a side street of Liverpool in the small hours under the headlamps of a Z car. What description had Tippit received by radio 15 minutes after the murder? "Height about so-and-so, weight so many pounds, wearing..." But at this stage who knew what he was wearing?
