

Report 2 Agents Disciplined by FBI

DALLAS, Sept. 29—The Dallas Times Herald said today in a copyrighted story that two Federal Bureau of Investigation agents were disciplined for their roles in the Lee Harvey Oswald case.

The Times Herald quoted what is called "unimpeachable sources" but did not name the agents.

The newspaper said one agent was demoted at a loss of \$1000 in annual pay and the other, stationed in New Orleans, was ordered transferred but refused the transfer and retired.

Oswald, accused as the assassin of President John F. Kennedy Nov. 22 in Dallas, once lived in New Orleans where he was active in the Fair Play for Cuba organization.

The New Orleans agent had been assigned the Oswald case while Oswald was in New Orleans. He now works as a private investigator in the Louisiana city.

The Dallas man was on the second level of command in the Dallas FBI office behind the special agent in charge and the assistant special agent.

The Dallas agent supervised the section under whose jurisdiction Oswald, as a returned defector to Russia, fell. He now investigates routine
