

Have No Evidence Of Conspiracy--Clark

ATLANTA (AP)—There is no significant evidence to indicate that more than one man was responsible for the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., according to U.S. Atty. Gen. Ramsey Clark.

Clark made the statement when questioned by newsmen about a possible conspiracy behind the King death.

"We could make a long, long list— as long as the imagination of man runneth— of people who could possibly be involved in this," Clark said, "but there's no significant evidence that it goes beyond the single actor."

The attorney general made no mention by name of James Earl Ray, who has been charged by the Federal Bureau of Investigation with conspiracy in the April 4 murder of King.

Clark did say he still feels sure an arrest will be made soon.

"I was hopeful an arrest would be obtained before now," he said. "The individual being sought is in a very difficult situation and it

will be difficult for him to avoid arrest."

Clark was in Atlanta over the weekend to speak at an Emory University Law Day luncheon.
