One founder of the John Birch Society announced his resignation yesterday in a dispute that is understood to involve both his asserted anti-Semitism and growing efforts to reduce the authority of Robert H. Welch Jr., the socie the society's president.

The founder who resigned is Prof. Revilo P. Oliver of the University of Illinois. He was one of the 11 men summoned by Mr. Welch to the society's organizational meeting in an Indianapolis motel in 1958.
