

# Enquirer Offers \$100,000 Reward for Proof of Conspiracy in JFK Killing

The NATIONAL ENQUIRER is offering \$100,000 to clear up — once and for all — the question:

Did Lee Harvey Oswald act alone, or was he part of a conspiracy to assassinate President John F. Kennedy?

We will pay the \$100,000 reward to anyone who provides The ENQUIRER with information and evidence which leads to the arrest and conviction of the conspirator or conspirators involved in the murder of the President on that fateful day, Nov. 22, 1963.

The offer expires at midnight on Sept. 1, 1976.

Our offer comes at a time of great public doubt over the conclusions of the Warren Commission, which said that

Oswald acted alone, and the Rockefeller Commission, which said that there was no CIA involvement in the assassination.

Probably no other government document has ever generated more controversy than the Warren Commission's report.

It has been attacked as hasty, biased and a whitewash.

The commission said it "found no evidence that Oswald was involved with any person or group in a conspiracy to assassinate the President" or any evidence that he "was employed, persuaded or encouraged by any foreign government" to kill Kennedy.

It also said that one bullet struck both the President and former Texas

Gov. John Connally, who was riding in the front seat of the car Kennedy was in.

Critics of the report claim Oswald couldn't have committed the crime alone.

They say:

- A film of the assassination reveals that Kennedy and Connally reacted to their wounds seconds apart — evidence that they were actually hit by separate bullets fired from two guns.

- A tape recording of Oswald's voice saying, "I didn't shoot anybody, no sir," showed the accused assassin was not lying, according to a stress analyzer that evaluates if a person is telling the truth.

Films of the death scene indicate

that Kennedy was caught in a cross-fire between at least two gunmen, say conspiracy believers who contend that some films show shadowy figures lurking in the bushes with what look like rifles.

There are just too many unanswered questions — questions that Americans want and need answered.
