Richard Sprague, chief counsel for the committee, and four other staff members spent two hours with Ray Tuesday at Brushy, where the confessed assassin is serving a 99-year sentence for the 1968 murder of civil rights leader, the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Jack Kershaw, the Nashville attorney representing Ray, said the committee is conducting "a careful, painstaking" investigation into the King murder.
