Allard Lowenstein was probably best known as the leader of the antiwar drive to dump Lyndon Johnson from the presidency. Yet he was much more. He fought for social justice and human dignity on many fronts: his battlefields stretched from South Africa to Czechoslovakia, from Vietnam to the American South, and he carried his causes from national student politics through the Congress and the UN. Now his better speeches have been collected and published in combination with a series of biographical profiles and some eulo-

gies. Given depth in Wechsler's introduction, these speeches and reflections well indicate the concerns felt by one of America's most irrepressible reformers. And, as they do, they speak well to the indomitability of conscience in our time.—*Charles DeBenedetti, History Dept., Univ. of Toledo, Ohio*
