
The defense, claiming that filed the original motion for a Ruby was insane, had requested sanity trial in April 1964. She tried to have it withdrawn. Friday but Holland denied the attempt,

The appeals court had suggested in 1965 that a sanity trial over which lawyers should represent Ruby.

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The Ruby family had said it did not want Tonahill, but Tonahill contended that whereas Ruby was sane when he hired him before the murder trial, he had since become insane, and therefore could not dismiss him.

The lawyer fight persisted until the appellate court ordered a sanity trial which would clear up the dispute.

Tonahill said Monday he would continue as Ruby's lawyer until ordered to get out of

the case by the appellate court. A source near the appeals court said it was unlikely that the appeal could be considered until October. The court's summer recess starts June 25.

One Ruby lawyer, Sol Dann of Detroit, said the defense might take the case into the federal; courts to further protest the sanity trial hearing.

One state witness jailed K. H. Crory, said he considered Ruby to be sane because "he's a pret-
