

New Orleans, March 9 (AP)-1 A grand jury moves into the first step into the investigation, controversial Kennedy assassination probe today with a subpena for a lawyer who once included Lee Harvey Oswald among his clients.

The Orleans Parish (county) grand jury ordered Dean A. Andrews Jr. to appear at its secret session for questioning today. Andrews is the Asst. DA in neighboring Jefferson Parish.

It marked the grand jury's a few minor legal matters for which New Orleans DA Jim Garrison contends will prove that a conspiracy was hatched in New Orleans which culminated in the assassination of President Kennedy in Dallas Nov. 22, 1963.

The Warren Commission said Oswald, a former New Orleans resident, shot the President and there was no credible evidence anyone else was involved.

Andrews, who said he handled

Oswald in the summer of 1963, told the Warren Commission that-shortly after the assassination-a man he knew as Clay Bertrand telephoned him and asked that he represent Oswald.

The FBI could never find a Clay Bertrand. Garrison contends that Clay L. Shaw, a prospercus New Orleans businessman, used the name Bertrand as an alias. Shaw said he has never used an alias.

Shaw, 54, former managing



director of the International Trade Mart here, was arrested March 1 and booked on conspiracy to murder. He is free on \$10,000 bond.
