

Garrison Calls for Shaw's Army Files

New Orleans, April 7 (AP)—A subpoena has been issued for the World War II military records of Clay L. Shaw, the retired executive charged with conspiring to murder President Kennedy.

A spokesman for Dist. Atty Jim Garrison said the subpoena was mailed to Washington yesterday to be served on the administrator of veterans affairs. Shaw was an Army major during the war.

The subpoena commands William J. Driver, the administrator, to have the file on Shaw

ready to be produced here in Criminal District Court April 24.

Garrison has accused Shaw, 54, of conspiring with Lee Harvey Oswald and David W. Ferrie in 1963 to kill the President.

Layton Patrick Martens, 24, a student at the University of Southwestern Louisiana in Lafayette, posted \$2,500 bond yesterday on a perjury indictment issued by the Orleans Parish grand jury making the conspiracy probe.

Testimony cited by the grand jury in making the perjury charge apparently did not di-

rectly involve the alleged conspiracy, centering mainly on a 1961 burglary.

Garrison said Shaw and Oswald met with Ferrie in September, 1963, and discussed assassination plans.

The major witness Garrison produced at a preliminary hearing on the charge against Shaw testified that Oswald was Ferrie's apartment mate at the time he heard the three men assassinate plans.

Shaw said he never knew Oswald or Ferrie.
