

Policemen in Hyattsville said that she had been treated for a wound in the knee and then released. "She is just, fine," a spokesman for police headquarters said.

Captain Dothard was said by Wallace campaign headquarters to have served as the Governor's personal security officer for many years. He was de-scribed as being married and in his mid-40's and was a familiar figure on all Wallace campaign trips.

Captain Dothard was described as being closer to Gov-ernor Wallace than any other member of the campaign en-tourage. Reporters who trav-eled with the Wallace party described the police captain as "the most popular cop" on the campaign trail and said he

had a laconic, droll wit. Mr. Zorvas was said to be a young, well-dressed agent based in Atlanta. He was second in command of the security detail assigned to protect Governor Wallace. Along with the chief of the detail, James Kelly, he was responsible for admin-istering all security techniques for the Wallace campaign as well as for accompanying the candidate personally at all times.
