More Indictments In Watergate Case Believed Pending

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WASHINGTON, March 1—
Further indictments in the
Watergate case are expected in
addition to the one today
against seven former aides to
President Nixon.

Indictments are expected in the investigation of the affairs of the International Telephone and Telegraph Corporation, of the White House special investigation unit known as the "plumbers," of the campaign of sabotage and dirty tricks, and of illegal campaign financing.

All but I.T.T. have been touched upon by indictments, guilty pleas and trials up to now.

The indictment today seemed to be an outgrowth of the investigation headed by the threeman team from the Justice Department—Earl J. Silbert, Seymour Glanzer and Donald E. Campbell. All withdrew from the case after a special prosecutor was appointed.

It was impossible to tell from the indictment whether new material had been developed beyond what the old prosecutors had worked out.

Leon Jaworski, the special Watergate prosecutor now in charge of the case, was named to his post after Mr. Nixon ordered the dismissal of Archibald Cox in a dispute over the White House's withholding of tape recordings sought by the grand jury.
