Dear Menachem,

The article by R. J. Donahue has one or two minor errors (i.e., that Oswald in the Marines had no training in the use of the telescopic sight) but on the whole it is a well-organized well-stated synthesis of some major defects in the case against Oswald. It is, of course, a simplified analysis; and as such would constitute a worthwhile presentation in a magazine which thus far has given little or no space to the subject of the Warren Report. Where TMO is concerned, the Salandria articles on the stretcher bullet and related evidence set a standard which seems to me to rule out for your readers this elementary recapitulation of familiar facts. Those who have completed a course in higher mathematics, so to speak, should not be asked to do simple arithmetic. I mean no offense to the writer, who has done a good job within the limits he set himself, and I would hope that he finds a suitable channel for the article, which has the merit of clarity and persuasiveness.
