There is a small matter that I had intended to mention but which I neglected to do each time we spoke recently.

Shortly after Garrison's investigation became public, one of the pilgrims returning from New Orleans asked me to send him my <u>Subject Index</u>. It was already out of print, and I had only my personal two copies—one kept at home, and the other kept at my office.

Because in those pre—Russo, pre—"code" days I had every desire to be helpful, and no reason to question the integrity or motives of the New Orleans investigation, I sent Garrison my office copy of the <u>Subject Index</u>.

In the light of what I now know about his scholarship and his methods as an "investigator," I see no reason to sacrifice that scarce copy of the <u>Index</u>. If he really does use it, he could I suppose make a xerox copy. In any case, it occurs to me that if you should leave New Orleans precipitously, I will lose the opportunity to retrieve the <u>Index</u>.

With this background, I should like to ask you—if it is feasible and non-risky—either now or at some time before you leave the D.A.'s office to send the <u>Index</u> back to me. I should be most grateful.
