Dear Mr. Crawford,

It is just a year today since the assassination and in addition to all the other feelings one experiences, I find myself wondering how many more years will pass before we are in a position to be fully satisfied that we have the whole truth. After we spoke last night, I heard a news item to the effect that the Warren Commission (not disbanded, as one had thought) has withdrawn the recommendation that the task of protecting the President should be transferred from the SS to the FBI. I spent the evening and most of today making some corrections in my analysis of the Warren Report, as suggested by the Behrends. I can now send you a copy, although not a very elegant one, I am sorry to say. I am sending you also a three-page summary of the analysis, of which a friend has kindly run off one hundred copies. I am not certain what I will do with them. Originally I thought that I might send the summary to publications with an indication that if they were interested in seeing the full article, I would be glad to send it—thus solving the problem of inadequate copies and avoiding useless postage costs. Now I have another thought too—sending the summary to the 552 witnesses and experts, with an appropriate covering letter to those who were directly involved in the findings which are questioned or challenged in the critique and mentioned in the summary. Perhaps the wisest course would be to do nothing until the Hearings come and I have had time to read them and judge whether the criticisms still stand. That is probably what I will do, from fatigue if not from prudence. Meanwhile, do let me have any ideas which may occur to you.
