The Warren Conmission has provided no information on Oswald's activities and novements between his arrival for work at about 8 a.m. and the last time he was known to be seen by a fellow-worker at about 11:45 on the morning of the assassination. Apparently ne attenpt has been made to reconstruct his actions and whereabouts during those crucial four hours-m-where did he hide and later retrieve the rifle, what work did he accomplish, where did he leave his blue jacket, when did he place the "shield" of cartons unobserved, and where and when did he assemble the rifle (estimated time required, six minutes). Did he make these preparations during the ten minutes which were available between the time that Bonnie Ray williams finished his lunch and left the sixth floor and the time the shots were fired? Did he make these preparations while Williams was eating his lunch, or while the floorlaying orew was at work? How much of those cruelal four hours was Oswald In the company of other employees, and how much was he out of sight and hearing and his whereabouts unaccounted for? Did he have the opportunity to admit or hide a confederate? Did he make any phone-calls? Was he seen during the coffee-break? in the washroom? Was there any deviation from his normal activities and behaviour?

These questions have not been answered by the Warren Conmission.
