

"The Kiddle of Dallas"

March 8, 1964

The attached article does not touch on the remarkable item of the marked map of the motorcade ^{route} map, which Wade first announced had been found in Oswald's room and was the clinching evidence of his guilt, but which map the Dallas police later said "did not exist."

No statement or report made publicly has ever given an account of Oswald's own statements while in the custody of the Dallas police from 22 November until he was murdered on 24 November, during which time he was under intensive questioning. What was his own account of his movements before, during and after the assassination? Did he, for example, claim to have been standing in the doorway of the Texas Book Depository building at the moment of the shooting? Did he admit being on the sixth floor? Or did he claim to be in a third place, and if so where?

After the attached article was written, Mark Lane testified to the Warren Commission that a meeting had been held in Jack Ruby's nightclub, two weeks before the assassination, between Oswald, Tippet, and a third person whose name Lane refused to make public but revealed to the Warren Commission in camera. (Wessman Tippet Ruby)

A story was published reporting widespread rumors that the Dallas police had been at the point of arresting Oswald and Ruby for the attempted murder of General Walker but had failed to make the arrest upon written request of the Justice Department.

A photograph taken at the moment that the bullets struck the President, showing a man in the doorway of the Texas School Book Depository Building who bears an extraordinary resemblance to Oswald, was widely printed in newspapers on 24 May 1964. The stories raised serious doubts about the FBI explanation that that man was in fact a Mr. Lovelady, who worked in that building and happened to resemble Oswald.

The questions raised by Professor Brienberg do not suggest carelessness or inefficiency on the part of the FBI and the other investigatory agencies. They suggest conspiracy. For those who shrink from the thought that the FBI or other official agencies could possibly be involved in a conspiracy to bring about the assassination of President Kennedy, or to conceal the identity of the real assassins, for those who would consider such a suggestion indecent, insane, and unthinkable---they might read the book Bay of Pigs by Johnson, which exposes the "indecent, insane and unthinkable" fact that the agents of the CIA who prepared the invasion of Cuba made careful preparations on two occasions at least to countermand and override President Kennedy's instructions in the event that he decided to call off the invasion plan. Although this book has been in print for some weeks at the time of this writing (30 May 1964) there is no indication that steps have yet been taken to identify the individual CIA agents involved and place them on trial for treason. WHERE WERE THOSE CIA AGENTS ON 22 NOVEMBER 1964? Those who would not stop at a treasonable action such as reversing a decision of the President in a matter involving war and peace would not stop at the assassination of that President.
