

EXPERTS FIND GAPS IN WARREN REPORT

CHICAGO, Feb. 25 (UPI) —

A panel of experts said today that the Warren Commission had failed to hear enough expert testimony and had not allayed public doubts about the assassination of President Kennedy.

The evaluation was made during a discussion by doctors, lawyers, criminologists and other experts at the 18th annual meeting of the American Academy of Forensic Sciences.

Dr. Maier Tuchler of Phoenix, Ariz., a psychiatrist, said he was "appalled" at the commission's conclusions "without the benefit of trained professional thinking."

He said it was impossible "to build up an understanding" of Lee Harvey Oswald based on the commission's conclusions as to his personality and motives.

A Kenosha, Wis., lawyer, Jay Schwartz, criticized Federal authorities for removing Mr. Kennedy's body from Parkland Hospital in Dallas, thus violating protocol, and for failing to corroborate the autopsy report.

Mr. Schwartz said the commission's report was based on evidence that would be inadmissible in a court of law.
