SO!!! WHAT ELSE IS NEW?

The recently formed Committee to Investigate Assassinations, which has its national headquarters in Washington, said that the events in New Orleans, Memphis, and Los Angeles made a thorough and open investigation of political assassinations more important than ever.

The Committee's spokesman, Bernard Fensterwald, Jr., said that "we welcome the government's statement that the Martin Luther King case is 'open'. However, in light of the government's elaborate cover-up in the brutal murder of President Kennedy, we shall not hold our collective breaths until it solves the other slayings."

The National Committee to Investigate Assassinations is currently running an independent investigation not only of the deaths of President Kennedy and Dr. King but also of Senator Robert F. Kennedy and Malcolm X.

The Committee spokesman said, "We are not sure that there was a conspiracy in each and every case, nor if there is a tie between the cases. But, there are large footprints all over the place, and we intend to see where they lead."
