Could not part of your diminished strength & health be due to the tremendous pressures you've been constantly plagued with? I hope you can find a way to slow down and get more rest.

About the contents of your letter, how many more "accidents" can be passed off before someone (Pam Jones?) finally does the i ??? God, how appalling it all is! I keep going back to Mr. Hollander and his "mythical" Barry Click - that other taxi-driver!!

Incidentally, my brother sent me a clipping from the Paris Herald Tribune of Dec. 22<sup>nd</sup> - an AP dispatch from Detroit -

containing a news item in which both Nixon(!?)  
& J. Edgar are implicated in Pres. K.'s assassination  
as a result of letters received by AFL-CIO  
headquarters in Detroit from 15 different  
unions across the country — and which  
purports to point the finger on the actual  
trigger men as being 2 members of a band  
of 10 men!! I could shoot myself because  
I, in my inimitable fashion, have managed  
to lose the clipping — but when I get to  
Paris (I arrive tomorrow, Sunday) & the bureau  
reopens on Monday, I will make it my bus-  
iness to track it down and, if possible, get  
several copies of it, one for you, of course.  
What do you make of that? It, of course,  
stimulates early suspicions that somewhere  
at the bottom of the large ugly pile is the  
fine Italian hand of J. Hoffa.

About N.Y. I was scheduled to  
reach there on Tuesday afternoon (the 4<sup>th</sup>)  
& would have stayed over a day or so  
in order to see you — but, on second thought,  
since Tues, Weds., & even Thursday are all  
working days for you, we would have, at



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best, only a very brief time together & obviously wouldn't be able to make Philadelphia or Washington & I have therefore decided to spend the extra day or two in Paris, instead. I still believe I can make the New York visit a bit later in the year, perhaps, when you & I can both plan it at a time that would be more flexible and convenient for you — for example, if I were to reach N.Y. toward the end of the week & we could then perhaps do the Phila. - Wash. jaunt together on a Friday night or Saturday - Sunday combination. Don't you agree? You see, my husband has to make N.Y. about every other month & I can surely arrange to accompany him on one of those future jaunts.

I lunched w. Buchanan again in Paris last week. He seemed pleased at the extent if not at the quality, of the coverage & that aspect, at least, is certainly remarkable. He showed me the Belgian, which was excellent

because they bothered to quote page + vol. (~~number~~) from my pamphlet — & while the photo reproductions were no more gratifying than those we've seen — the article generally was very good.) He's also in the Japanese weekly magazine. He's had absolutely no response of any kind thus far; no letters addressed to him + none to the magazine directly. That was true at least up until Dec. 22<sup>nd</sup> when I left Paris — but something may have occurred in the interim, although I'm a bit doubtful, at this point — the interest just doesn't seem to exist any more.

At this point I'll probably reach N.Y. sometime Wednesday, will stay right at Kennedy to await my husband (who gets to N.Y. from here on Monday) + we'll fly to L.A. together — so that, I most likely won't even come in to the City — but I will call you — depending on the time of day (flight not booked yet), either at your office or at home.
