Dear Sen. Fulbright,

Since you have manifested your unique and admirable courage many times during your years of service to this nation - (and especially as regards our tragic and even scandalous position in Vietnam) - I am taking the liberty of calling upon your courage to support yet another ~~cause~~ and equally important cause - the revelation of the true circumstances surrounding the murder of President Kennedy.

I write this with the full knowledge of what the inherent implications of my request entail - but we can no longer pretend that "political truth" and considerations of "national interest" are valid substitutes for what took place in Dallas on November 22, 1963.

The Warren Commission was supposed to have been (by its own description) "a fact-finding agency committed to the ascertainment of the truth". Having laboriously and carefully studied the 26 volumes of testimony, hearings and exhibits over the past 2 years, I can assure you that the Commission was not "committed to the...truth" and that its conclusions do not reflect the evidence. I do not make this statement carelessly or irresponsibly, but with the assurance that comes from researching every available document and facet of the material released by the Commission.

A thorough, unbiased and meticulous investigation must be made and, regardless of where such an investigation may lead us, this nation cannot be considered to be healthy and confident of its governing body unless the full truth is revealed. Events, both present and future - policies, both domestic and foreign - may well hang in the balance.

I call upon your historic devotion and dedication to the United States, therefore, to fortify your determination to personally investigate this matter and I urge you to act as soon as possible for I cannot help but feel that time is running out for those of us who are appalled by what is happening in Vietnam and by what has been withheld from us as regards the President's death.
