Dear Congressman Kupferman--

I am, presntly, in receipt of a "News Release" from your office which indicates that on Sept.28th,'66, you introduced in the House of Representatives, a "Resolution to establish a Joint Committee to Determine the Necessisty of a Congressional Investigation of the Assassination of President Kennedy".

I can only hope that your "Resolution" will not falter ~~and~~ die either through lack of support and encouragement - or through ignorance of the contents of the 26 Volumes of Testimony, Hearings, and Exhibits published by the Warren Commission.

The latter premise is a serious obstacle for, having studied the 26 Volumes, I can assure that they consume months of tim~~e~~ on the part of the reader and I can also assure you that, without having read these volumes, one cannot be considered to be knowledgeable about "the case", and about the circumstances surrounding the 3 murders involved.

It is of the utmost importance that an unbiased and thorough investigation into President Kennedy's murder be made - and as soon as possible, for the American people have, to date, not had the opportunity of carefully evaluating results of such an investigation. There has not been such an investigation.

History, events of both present and future, domestic and foreign policy may well hang in the balance. It is long past the time when we can delude ourselves that the Warren Commission's conclusions are correct. They are not. I have been researching the case for 2 years, day and night, and the conclusions do not reflect the evidence.

I commend you, Sir, on your courage in bringing this urgent matter to the attention of your colleagues and of your constituents, for your courage is unique among our elected representatives. I urge you to pursue the matter relentlessly.
