My earlier memorandum of today lists the itens of evidence received in this matter to date. Among those items was the revolver seized from suspect lee Inarvey oswald upon his arrest following the killing of Dallas police officer Tippett and the fatal bullet removed from Officer Tippett's body.

The examination of these items is now complete. It has been determined that the bullet, a copper coated lead bullet of .38 Special caliber, is so badly mutilated that there are not sufficient marks on its surface to permit identification of the particulax weapon from which it was fired. However, it was deterinined that the suspect's revolver is among those weapons producing rifling impressions of the nunber, type and size as those presently on the fatal bullet.

The remaining examinations are in progress and you will be advised of the results immediately upon their completion.
