Dear Mr. Rankin:

Reference is made to my letter dated December 13, 1963, enclosing a summary of the results of the investigations of several hoaxes and false reports which had arisen in connection with the Oswald case. The following information supplements the data previously furnished to you in this regard.

The FBI has been furnished four letters written from Cuba indicating or alleging that the assassination of President Kennedy was undertaken by Oswald under the direction of a Cuban agent, one Pedro Charles, who reportedly gave Oswald \$7,000 for this mission. Specifically, these letters are as follows:

(1) A letter dated November 19, 1963, but postmarked November 23, 1963, at Havana, Cuba (six days after the assassination), signed by Pedro Charles and addressed to Oswald, c/o "Post Mail Office," Dallas, Texas. This letter was intercepted by the Secret Service and was referred to the FBI.

(2) A letter addressed to the Attorney General postmarked November 23, 1963, at Havana and signed by Mario del Rosario Molina. This letter was referred to the FBI by the Department of Justice.

(3) A letter postmarked November 3, 1963, at Havana and addressed to the Voice of America and signed by Miguel Calvo Lopez. This communication was referred to us by the United States Information Agency.

(4) A letter postmarked Dec 22, 1960, at Havana,  
signed by Miguel Calles Lopez and addressed to the "Editor of  
the Diario de P. M. Notas," a Spanish-language newspaper published  
in New York City. This letter was forwarded to the FBI by an  
official of the newspaper.

The copy each of the above numbered letters is  
enclosed herewith.

In regard to the first envelope, the first letter received was purportedly  
written by Fidel Castro, who dated it two weeks prior to the  
President's assassination, and was designed to give the impression  
Castro was furnishing instructions to Oswald relative to the  
assassination. The other three letters purport to be from  
individuals who have knowledge that Castro conspired with Oswald  
to kill the President. However, examinations by the FBI Laboratory  
have shown that all of these communications were actually  
prepared on the same typewriter and that several of the envelopes  
used came from the same source. It is, therefore, clear that  
this represents some type of hoax, possibly on the part of some  
anti-Castro group seeking to discredit the Cuban Government.
