Dear Sylvia,

May I congratulate you on your book, even before the official publication date? It is a remarkable achievement; I am sure that I will be reading it and referring to it for a long time.

Thanks for the credits you give me in the book. Since I last wrote to you about a year ago, I have been working on the assassination only intermittently. I have been trying to keep up with the New Orleans investigation, and have done some work based on letters to the Archives; I have been corresponding primarily with Harold Weisberg. Rather than go into details here, I would like to make a proposal: I am in the process of getting a microfilm copy of my files, mainly to protect my records in case of loss. I would like to send you a copy of this microfilm, which you could keep for some time if you wish. I expect that you are quite busy, but I think that in a few hours you could pick out any interesting items, which I could then send you copies of. I don't think I have anything of major importance, but some items might relate to areas you have been working on.

I cannot disagree with the statements in your book about Garrison. I too have noticed errors of fact, some of which I have pointed out to Tom Bethell. Arnoni's point (yours too, I presume) that Garrison may be falling into a trap seems well taken. (I would like to learn more about the incidents of planted false leads that I have only read about.) However, Weisberg's latest book has convinced me that Garrison is onto something.

Please let me know if you would like to look at my files at your convenience. Some examples of my recent work that might interest you are enclosed.
