wording on the Kennedy Assassination marker located in  
Dealy Plaza. Dallas had planned to have the city history  
on the marker with a small addendum pointing out that,  
incidentally, this is also the spot on which President Ken-  
nedy was assassinated.

Thanks to Mrs. Langley, the marker was changed and  
the City (1c) history deleted. Again, the statement of  
President Andrew Jackson was confirmed: "One man with  
courage makes a majority."

Under great pressure, and while suffering extreme  
pain, Mrs. Langley made her contribution to history. A  
grateful nation will remember her.
