Thanks for your note. It is a strange commentary on the American people that a majority are opposed to any reinvestigation of the assassination, although a majority also rejects the Warren Report. Presumably the same individuals are to be found in both groups. The moral seems to be that the assassins may still be at large, but why bother to find them? Or to compel the Government to respect the intelligence and the rights of the people? The peculiar activities of the New Orleans district attorney since the canvass you conducted will probably have raised the ratio of those opposed to a new investigation, by now, to a far higher figure.

The official date of publication of the book is November 30th, Bob Oskens tells me. I am sure he will be sending you a review copy, somewhat earlier. I hope that you will review it, as you once mentioned, for the Villager—or was it the Village Voice? I hope that at about the same time Bernard Geis Associates will issue Six Seconds in Dallas, by Professor J. D. (Tink) Thompson. I have read the ms. and believe that this book makes an important contribution to our understanding of what did, and did not, happen in Dallas.
