On the subject of books, I've heard that your next will be on the racial interments during World War II and would impose on you to suggest an aside or a footnote. Many of us are extremely concerned over the six interment camps set up under the Smith and McCarren acts and about the fact that few people know that they exist. Further, I was told last week that more were being built - about which it might be possible for me to find out more. I'm enclosing a clipping that has an indirect connection, at least in my head.
