We must, first of all, question Volkland more about this whole incident, find out exactly how he knows the time was 12:40, on what criteria does he base his remembrance of time. He must question people in that gasoline station and round up other witnesses who saw Officer Tippit and try to find out what caused Tippit to leave. Did he hear a radio broadcast? Did they see him pick up his rifle and telephone and then start the car moving? Did another police car drive up or what? But this is an extremely fruitful area for further investigation.

We should also, when pursuing this, go to Kiest Boulevard and Bonnie View Drive and try to see if we find people in that area, people in shops who by that time having heard about the President's assassination may be wandering around outside, may have seen Officer Tippit in Car 10, right there at that location. So the question is, Was Tippit lying when he reported in from Kiest and Bonnie View,? Was this radio log faked afterwards to give Tippit a set of movements which would come from the dispatcher? because this would certainly bear looking into.

Volkland interview

NOTE: I AM WRITING A COMMUNIQUE WITH THE LINES

Al Volkland is a Dallas Free-lance photographer. He took the picture appearing on the top of page 24 in the hard-cover book "Four Days." It shows the presidential limousine just as it got into the Dealey Plaza area. This was taken on the twilight side. The car is moving towards Dallas and owned by Al Volkland because Bill Gammie has a Dallas Photo-Miniature and Gammie has sold his to Volkland because Bill Gammie has a Dallas Photo-Miniature in the office and the picture was in the Dallas-Herald three days after Al Volkland's name where the photo appeared. I have called Al Volkland to find out some information about the picture. We ended finding not only information about the picture, but we gained much information about Gammie's whereabouts immediately after the assassination.

First we start with some peripheral information here. In order to get the negative, or prints from Al Volkland's original negative, one must contact John Naszicutt. He is in the photo department at the Dallas Times-Herald. One can also obtain prints of this picture by contacting United Press International in New York, since this picture has bought by UPI. But the original negative is with the Dallas Times-Herald. According to Volkland he was with his wife in their car coming down the Stemmons Freeway towards the direction, towards the direction where the President got on. In other words, he would have passed the President's car going in a certain direction. Before he approached the Stemmons overpass, this is not the triple bridge, but the Stemmons overpass, he pulled his car over, this is about the 8th block of Stemmons, pulled his car over and got out of the car and prepared to take a picture. He pre-focused his camera, he said to 100th of a second, of something like that, and he aimed his camera and the President's car came driving by, Clint Hill on the back, and I questioned him closely about whether there had been any monkey-business there on the Freeway because the blur in the picture would indicate the car is going backwards, and the car in back of the President's car, that is the follow-up car for the Secret Service seems to be

Continued. Volkland explained that this was due to a weird effect--the film
was held about a pre-focus point where he was aiming the camera and so the blur
appeared in front of the picture. And therefore, the camera caught the follow-up
car coming from the pre-focus point as it was the railway car had a light blue
streamer behind and the President's car looks as though it's going backwards. At
any rate, Volkland relates that when the cars passed him they were hitting
about. Of course in the background of Volkland's picture can be seen the railroad
yards in back of the Jones Schoolbook Depository and the tower in which towerman
Lee Harvey was in and probably the back of the building.

Volkland told me that just before the shooting started, now he couldn't hear the
shots because just before the shooting started a switch-train which had just been
sitting there [idle] in the railroad yard, started up, and this is a switch-train,
this is a train with 8 or 9 boxcars on it that crosses the triple underpass with
its train of boxcars trailing out behind. This is the train that prevented any
police on the platform of the triple underpass from even knowing that there was
shooting, less than hearing the sound of the shots. And Volkland told me he
informed all three of the police, that the switch-train, which had just been sitting
there [idle] suddenly started up, just before what he realized later was the shooting,
and headed toward the triple overpass with its string of cars. But nothing
ever came of it.

Fact: Volkland lives about two blocks north, Volkland's position is about two
blocks north of the Stemmons Freeway overpass, repeat, this is not the triple
overpass, it is the Stemmons Freeway overpass.

He's driving his car back to his residence now. He told me his wife was working at the train station, and he had a signal 10 on the radio. One other item: before the President's motorcade came through, it passed over a bridge with Dallas plaidcloth amen (and I don't know what Chief Burley was at the wheel, and it was a Ford. And the train in the background there is now running over the triple overpass is a Rock Island Mine train.

So he got back in his car and started going home, and he ran out of gas. Now I don't know if he means he actually ran out of gas and had to go to the gas station to get a tank of gas, a can of gas, or whether he just noticed his gas gage was low--he'll have to be questioned on this. But he pulls up to a gas station at Zang's and Marsalis. Now this gas station at Zang's and Marsalis is exactly at the point where the Houston Street viaduct crossing the Trinity River comes over to the East Dallas side of Dallas. The Houston St. viaduct it should be noted is the one used by cab driver Winkley in driving Oswald across the river after he allegedly killed Winkley's cab in trying to make his getaway from the Texas School Book Depository. Now Volkland told us on the phone, and by us I mean myself and BILL GRIER. He was listening to part of the conversation that when he entered the gasoline station, and we don't know yet whether that was on foot looking for a gasoline car or whether he drove in in his car, but when he entered the station parked on the station's grounds was Officer Tippit, sitting in his car, observing traffic coming over the Houston St. viaduct coming from this location. And he specifically stated, Officer Tippit was there observing traffic. In other words, you got the impression of the police car parked in the gasoline station, and Tippit observing the traffic. You do not get the impression that Tippit is talking there talking anything over with the gasoline station attendant or buying him lunch or anything of that sort. He's sitting there using the gasoline station premises as a place from which to observe traffic. Another fact is that Tippit is

sitting in the north side of the driveway. The Tippit car is in the north side of the driveway, by the exit mouth of the overpass. Now I have here a note: From Dallas to Oak Cliff, 1400 block. I think that refers to the direction in which Tippit's car is pointed on the gas station grounds. And Volkland informed me Tippit lived in the 1100 block of North Beckley.

Questions that must be asked of Volkland are the following:

How does he know it was only ten minutes? What is the criterion? I didn't question him about this on the phone.

How long did he stay at the gasoline station? When does he first remember the time after he left. Did he see a clock afterwards, was it 12:45 by the time he left?

Now he told us that shortly after this, he was at a relative's house in Benavides, and that during a diaper service truck was at this relative's house and he had just come from the Tippit shooting. And from the talk that Benavides gave, Volkland was under the impression that some of the witnesses mistook Benavides for one of the Tippit killers and this might be looked into by either asking Benavides exactly what he did, looking at his testimony because it's possible that Benavides in running around there gave the impression that he was running away from the crime. This is just a thought. Before Volkland got to the gasoline station, this was sometime between 12:30 and 12:40 and while he was driving in his car and he has a police radio in the car he heard Sergeant Hill's voice coming on the radio, telling the police department to surround the building. And this was on channel one. (HILL: Sylvia Marguer tells us that at 12:45 Tippit reported by radio that he's at Knesey(SPI) and Bonneyview. I've looked on a Dallas map; I think that's misspelled, I think it's actually spelled Kiest and Bonneyview; this is Kiest Boulevard and Bonney View Drive. That intersection is considerably past the Houston Street viaduct and it should be noted that we can see here

the end the railroad tracks that went over the Triple Underpass to
still continue over the Trinity River, possibly in some sort of railroad
bridge, and those same railroad tracks go right past Kiest and Bonnieview.
Meanwhile, please note, neither the Houston Street viaduct nor the Kiest
and Bonnie View locations can really be considered to be in Oak Cliff--Fippit's
assigned area. The Houston St. Viaduct is in an area called Kessler Stevens
Park. And the Kiest and Bonnie View location is smack in the center of a
location called Cedar Crest.
