ERIC is a national information system for gathering, indexing, storing, and disseminating a variety of printed reports and papers associated with the field of education. Over the years, several thousand items have entered the system that are only remotely related to the discipline of education. This annotated bibliography, compiled from those general-interest documents, brings to light 516 publications of special merit all available from ERIC. Items are arranged within 17 general subject categories (children, aged, women, ethnics, handicapped, recreation, science, business, finance, employment, media, social issues, youth, etc.). The Unknown ERIC uncovers much worthwhile primary resource material in a variety of subject areas, all available from one "publisher" at low cost. A detailed subject index and an author index are provided.

The Master Index provides indexes to the reports and the forty supporting volumes of the two major official investigations of the assassination of President John F. Kennedy—the first, by the Warren Commission in 1964, and the second, by the House Select Committee on Assassinations in 1979. These massive historical reports with their accompanying volumes of hearings and exhibits were published with little or no internal indexing. The Master Index fills the gap by providing a series of indexes which introduce order and enable accessibility to information in this immense body of evidence. It is an indispensable tool to researchers and investigators interested in the JFK assassination and to students of governmental investigatory processes.

*Basic Reference Sources*, first published in 1971 and now in its second revision, is designed as a self-study, self-paced introduction to general reference/information sources. The new second edition of this new standard learning tool brings information about the sources up to date as of late summer, 1980, adding or deleting some titles where appropriate. About 150 general sources are covered in detail, and about 150 additional titles are noted in a supplementary way. The manual is designed to be worked through in sequence, but modifications can be made successfully. While primary use of the manual continues to be in library science courses in basic reference/information programs, it is also suitable for use in staff development and continuing education programs.

This volume begins the second decade of annual coverage of the literature of librarianship. Selected from almost 100 articles nominated by readers, jurors, and the editor, the thirty chosen come from newcomers such as *Collection Building*, *Library Acquisitions: Practice & Theory*, and *Public Library Quarterly*; specialized periodicals like *Voyage and Sightlines*; and library-related journals such as *Scholarly Publishing*, *American Archivist*, and *Book Production Industry*.

Controversial pieces include a critique of the Pittsburgh study, an indictment of the new Dewey 19, intrigue in FLA, the promotion of the KKK by Junior Scholastic, and a call for more rigor in reference book reviewing. There are articles for all segments of the profession—school, public, academic, and special librarians, whether in technical services, public services, or administrative posts. Among the authors are Patricia Battin, Daniel J. Boorstin, Thomas Childers, Nat Hentoff, Jonathan Kozol, Pnyllis Richmond, and Gerald Salton.
