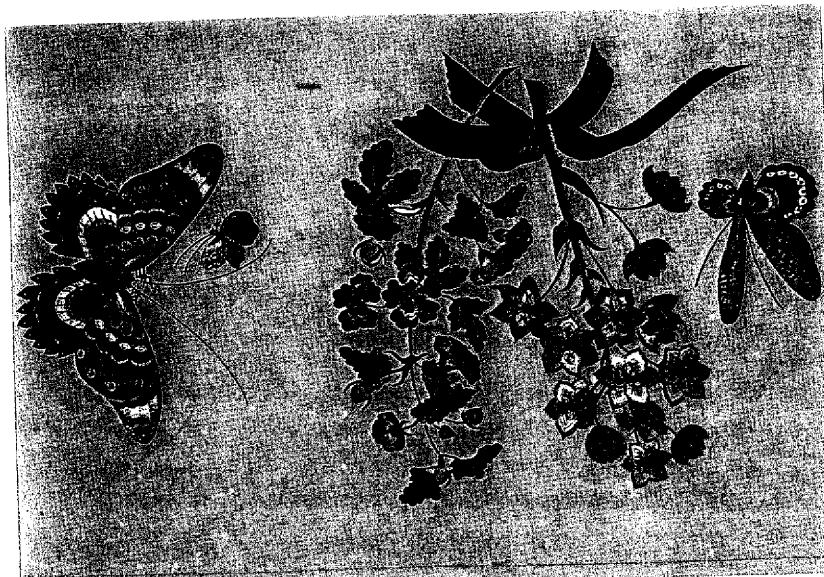


Dear Aunt Sylvia-
