Samper attracted my attention early, because (1) he seemed very evasive about the source of the 12:45 description of the suspect and about his failure to send men up to the 6th floor after the Euins report of a man with rifle there; and (2) his remarks about Givens are highly suspicious and seem to contain a serious anachronism.

I'm very glad you are scrutinizing him.

On the specific question you raise about Sayyer's unaccounted-for instant presence in the TSED—that I will have to put off until my return. I would like to re-read his testimony and the radio logs, because I don't remember at this moment just what Sawyer had to say.

If I can throw any light on the question when I re-read, I'll write again.

Thank you for your kind words about my book. I have an hour of panic daily about its merit—rather, its lack of merit—and there are moments when I feel that I should go into hiding when it comes out. I guess that happens in every childbirth and this one will be mine months more in coming. I hope it will not disappoint any of my colleagues too much—and I can assure you on one point right away: my book does not attack any of the critics.
