Dear Dr. Abrahamsen.

As author of the <u>Subject Index</u> to the Warren Report and the Hearings and Exhibits, and of a full-length study of the Report to be published by The Bobbs-Merrill Company on 30 November 1967, I read with considerable interest the story in the New York <u>Times</u> of 12 October 1967 about your three-year study of Lee Harvey Oswald.

I agree that Oswald "was unable to be a part of a conspiracy," as you reportedly said in an interview last week. I do not agree, after my three-year study of the testimony and the material and circumstantial evidence, that Oswald committed the assassination or the other crimes of which he has been accused by the Warren Commission and its apologists, or by the district attorney whose pronouncements have been much in the headlines.

Time does not permit me to elaborate the many arguments against the thesis that Oswald was the lone assassin, which is evidently the assumption on which you predicated your study. However, I take the liberty of enclosing my review of a book by another member of your profession whose doctrine of Oswald's lone-assassinship is not unlike your own.
