The two columns by Jack Anderson in The New York Post of 1/18 and 1/19 chillingly establish the shadowy ambience preceding Nov. 22, 1963.

Sound familiar?

This was Morris Ernst on "The Galindez case".

It initially appeared that Professor Galindez of Columbia
University was kidnapped and subsequently murdered by Trujillo
agents. A great outcry followed. Ernst, retained by Trujillo,
discovered that Galindez was a CIA operative and the recipient
of at least \$767,000 in Agency funds. Ernst was flown to
Washington and agreed to suppress the information on the promise
of Allen Bulles that the matter would be clarified at a later date.
It never was.

The affair is amusingly chronicled in <u>Trujillo: The last Caesar</u> by Gen. Arturo Espaillat.

But the GIA had been successful. The cover story held. Truth would have a later and limited distribution.
