I received the Braverman article this morning--many thanks. I went through it hurriedly and found many interesting points, most all of which need to be further developed. The piece is really too thin as it is, but Braverman seems to have the expertise and with some guidance probably could furnish the necessary elaboration. I will write to him as soon as possible.

The Dilber letter also arrived today, and I intend to pass it on to Dr. Forman.

I hope we'll be able to arrange a meeting with Dr. Forman at Kennedy on July 9. And I think it would be good for Ruth Fortel to be there, even if the collaboration doesn't prove necessary or desirable. After seeing Braverman's work, I'm inclined to agree with you that a collection of independent studies is the best idea. In that case, Ruth's contribution could be confined to the head shot--though it might be possible also to integrate her very good work on the first shot with Dr. Forman's. I suppose the thing will have to remain fluid for a while.

We had agreed to talk by phone on Monday--it just occurred to me that I will be in Washington then (going back and forth so much, I'm getting confused.) I'll be in N.Y. on the 4th, 5th, and 6th, so will call you then.
