Hy dear Hr. Bender,

I have received your registered letter of 2 April 1953 in which you request me to submit Civil Hervice Identification and Personnel Data forms to you "in accordance with the provisions of Executive Order 10422 dated January 9, 1953".

I have read this Executive Order carefully and find no provisions in it which give any official of the United States Mission the authority to make such a request as is contained in your letter of 2 April 1953. The Executive Order, Part III, provides for an arrangement between the executive heads of the specialized agencies concerned and the appropriate officials of the United States Government for the submittal of information on United States Citizens. However, I have not been requested by my Director-General to complete any questionnaires nor to comply with any other procedures such as fingerprinting.

Therefore, I feel that your request has no legitimate basis and represents an uncarranted invasion of my privacy. In consequence, as a matter of principle, I find myself unable to comply with your request. Should I be called to testify by any congressional conmittee or other duly constituted body, I an entirely willing to do so and I would not invoke the Fifth Amendment, since there is nothing in my private or professional life which I fear to expose to acrutiny.
