Subject: Executive Order 10422: Applicability to United States Citizens Employed in Public International Organizations of which the United States is a Member.

1. On January 9, 1953 the President of the United States signed and promulgated Executive Order 10422 "prescribing procedures for making available to the Secretary General of the United Nations certain information concerning United States citizens employed or being considered for employment on the Secretariat of the United Nations." A copy of this Executive Order is attached herewith.

2. It will be noted that while the title of the Order, the material preliminary to Parts I and II and Parts I and II themselves relate to United States citizens employed by the United Nations, Part III of the Order provides for the application of the Order to United States citizens who are employees of or are being considered for employment by other public international organizations of which the United States Government is a member, by arrangement between the executive head of the international organization concerned and the Secretary of State or other officer of the United States designated by the President. In accordance with this provision of Part III arrangements have been made between the executive heads of the above named organizations and the Secretary of State for the Order to be applied to United States citizens employed or being considered for employment in these international organizations.

3. United States citizens employed by the above-named organizations and whose duty stations are in the field (excluding Washington, D. C.) are requested to complete four copies of the attached Identification and Personal Data form and return them by post without delay to the United States Resident Delegation to International Organizations, 1 Rue du Temple, Geneva, Switzerland. Such citizens are also requested to report to the nearest United States consulate or diplomatic mission with the attached finger print chart and have their fingerprints taken. The consulate or mission will return the finger print chart to the United States Resident Delegation in Geneva.

4. Each person is requested to bring an identity document, preferably his passport.
