(despite my letter asking that he not call any more)

He called because "we were going to meet in a few days;" when I disclaimed all knowledge of such a meeting, he said that John Berendt had told him a few minutes before that there was to be a payment to Brown and questioning of him by Vince, Berendt, Jones Harris, and maybe Tink Thompson—and, according to Berendt, by me—over the weekend or early next week.

I repeated that I had not been consulted about this, knew nothing about it, and would not participate as I had already been on one such wild-goose chase. JH said he "knew all about that"—apparently then he did receive a full report on "Rita," despite Vince's indications to the contrary. I washefinite about not taking part in this and suggested again that I did not believe Brown had anything—that he had turned up and become available for questioning somewhat too propitiously, together with sundry other purveyors of "breakthroughs."

JH apologized humbly several times for telephoning—about as sincerely as his various other missions of ingratiation for the purpose of brain-picking and keeping his finger on the pulse of the critics' activities.
