I should like to say, for the record, what I have said to you verbally immediately upon receipt of your letter, on the telephone last night, which you confirmed was also your understanding of the situation, namely, that in accepting and reviewing this material, I am in no way whatsoever assuming any obligation to modify by one iota my public or private position with respect to the Garrison investigation, and that $I$ intend to continue to exercise complete independence of judgment and expression. It is my understanding also that my acceptance and review of the documents is not to be interpreted, technically or substantively, as an association on my part with the, Garrison investigation of any degree whatever.

That being understood, I should like to thank you again and assure you that I will not fail to call your attention to any discrepancies between these documents and those of the Warren Commission and to any other anomolies which seem to merit comment. With best personal regards to you, Tom,
