Thank you for your kind letter concerning our draft brief. We were very pleased to receive such generous praise from an expert in the field such as yourself. Of course we realize our work can be greatly improved.

You indicated a willingness to assist responsible critics in their efforts to find out the truth in this matter. We were wondering if it would be possible for you to help us in preparing a final brief or perhaps a list of particulars for distribution to Congressmen. We have been in contact with Harold Weisberg who suggested we consult you for an outline listing the most important pieces of evidence.

What essentially we would like to know is what you would include in a brief for members of Congress. While we do

possess some knowledge in the field, we feel it is wise to defer to your expert knowledge for the most effective and persuasive arguments.

We, of course, hesitate to make any demands on your time. But we feel that a polished and concise statement would help greatly in our efforts on the Hill, and in ^{our} composing one you would be of great assistance.

Mark Lane's group, Citizens Commission of Inquiring Hill, they refused to submit our draft brief with their material, saying it was "too easy to shoot full of holes." While we take this with a grain of salt, we realize we can do better.

Any assistance you would be able to give would be greatly appreciated. I have been impressed by the interest here in Washington for a reinvestigation and am optimistic that one will develop if the responsible critics can take the lead and capture the attention of Congress. A good brief might help to accomplish just that purpose.
