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The Plot To Kill President Kennedy

Touring Civil War Battlefields (TravelNetwork, Inc., P.O. Box 11345, Chicago, Illinois 60611, 312-266-9400; VHS or Beta, 60 minutes, \$29.95).

Honoring the 125th anniversary of the War Between the States, this video takes viewers on a tour of several major Blue and Gray battlefields: Manassas (Bull Run); Gettysburg; Antietam; Fredericksburg; and Appomattox Court House, where the surrender documents were signed in 1865. The highlights of the production are its panoramic views of the modernday sites, enhanced by living history re-enactments. The narrative includes background on many important Civil War leaders, and portrays the day-to-day life of the ordinary foot soldier. This film received first place in the 1987 American Film Awards for "Best Education Video.'

Was Lee Harvey Oswald acting alone when he assassinated President John F. Kennedy on November 22, 1963 in Dallas, or was he the "trigger man" for a possibly international plot involving the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA), the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), the Mafia, or others? According to this tape, recently declassified government documents and interviews with key figures suggest a conspiracy that began with Mafia leaders attempting to get at the president and his brother Robert F. Kennedy (then attorney general), both of whom had drastically cracked down on organized crime. Because questions still remained after the investigation conducted by



the Warren Commission (which concluded that Oswald acted alone), in 1976 a congressional committee launched the most exhaustive and expensive investigation in American history in an effort to determine once and for all who was involved in the JFK assassination: "The Committee believes, on the basis of the evidence available to it, that President John F. Kennedy was probably assassinated as a result of conspiracy. . . . " and that "members of an anti-Castro group may have been involved." Says one interviewee, who claims to have been directly offered money to assist in the assassination plot, "it was a question of how and when [Kennedy was assassinated] not a question of if."

An upbeat montage of Marilyn Monroe, Presidents Eisenhower, Kennedy, and Nixon, the Berlin Wall, the Bay of Pigs, the Beatles, bomb banning and bra burning, man on the moon, and civil rights, The Fabulous Sixties consists of ten year-by-year tapes and a capsule retrospective. Light, trendy items such as Twiggy, underwater weddings, Warhol's pop art, and Haight-Ashbury hippie love-ins provide relief from the Thalidomide tragedy, Watts, Vietnam, three assassinations, and Chicago Democratic Convention riots. From two Kennedys' presidential campaigns to Tokyo hosting the Olympic games, this nostalgic, comprehensive series summarizes what has been termed the most turbulent decade in U.S. history. *
