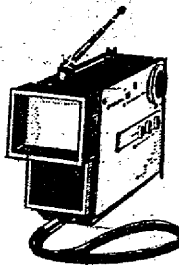


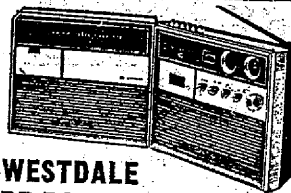

Pathologist in Bid to See Evidence in JFK Slaying

TOPEKA, Kan. (AP) — A pathologist at the University of Kansas Medical Center has filed suit in federal court for the right to examine evidence in the assassination of President Kennedy.

Dr. John M. Nichols sued James B. Rhoads, U. S. archivist, and John H. Chaffee, secretary of the Navy, for the right to examine bullet fragments and clothing from the shooting in Dallas on Nov.

22, 1963. He wants to subject the evidence to "neutron activation analysis" in the atomic nuclear accelerator at the University of Kansas to see if the fragments are different.

"If the trace metal compositions are different," he said, "then the late president and Gov. John B. Connally of Texas of necessity were struck by different bullets."

The methods of modern

pathology were not adequately used in the autopsy of President Kennedy, Nichols has charged. However, his previous attempts to check the evidence presented to the Warren Commission have failed. In January of 1969, Nichols filed a federal suit seeking the autopsy exhibits filed with the archivist by the Kennedy family but did not succeed.

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
