ReBulet to Dallas under above captioned dated 5/31/62, wherein Dallas was instructed to be alert for subject's return to the United States and interview OSWALD to determine if he was recruited by Soviet intelligence.

On 6/4/62, Mrs. FRANCES VAN COTT, Office of Special Consular Services, U. S. Department of State (USDS), advised SA KENNETH J. HASER that by telegram dated 5/31/62, the U. S. Embassy in Moscow informed the Department of State, that LEE HARVEY OSWALD, his wife and child planned to depart Moscow on 6/1/62, for Rotterdam, Holland, where they would be boarding the "Maasdam" on 6/4/62. The "Maasdam" is scheduled to arrive in New York, New York, on 6/6/62. The Department of State has notified the subject's mother by letter concerning the following information.

On 6/5/62, the files of the Passport Office, USDS, were reviewed by SA VINCENT P. DUNN and found to contain the following information:

A Navy Department communication dated 3/3/62, reflected that OSWALD, by personal letter to the Secretary of the Navy, dated 1/30/61, advised he was preparing to return to the United States and wished to rectify the "gross injustice" done to him by the U. S. Marine Corps in giving him a "belated dishonorable discharge." He stated he had received an honorable discharge after three years service on 9/11/59. In this letter OSWALD stated he was still a United States citizen and alleged he had gone to the Soviet Union to reside for a "short time."

This Navy Department communication pointed out that OSWALD was released under honorable conditions to inactive duty in the Marine Corps Reserve on 9/11/59, with obligated reserve service until 12/8/62. On 8/17/60, OSWALD was given a dishonorable discharge from the U. S. Marine Corps Reserve for a reason of unfitness.

USDS memorandum dated 5/4/62, stated that on the basis of evidence OSWALD had not expatriated himself under the pertinent laws of the United States.

On 5/5/62, the files of the Security Office, USDS, were reviewed by SA DUNN and found to contain the following information:

By letter dated 5/10/62, the Office of Security, advised the Director of the Naval Intelligence, Department of the Navy, Washington, D. C., that OSWALD had not expatriated himself under the pertinent laws of the United States.

On 6/5/62, the files of the Special Consular Services, USDS, were reviewed by SA DUNN and it was noted that by telegram dated 3/7/62, the USDS authorized the American Embassy in Moscow to furnish a repatriated loan to the subject to cover the cost of his passage to New York, New York, only.
